FRANK LOVE GLADNEY, (descended from Anderson Bean Gladney, GIA pg. 76) was a Navy PBY pilot, stationed at Pearl Harbor. He was not assigned to a specific ship, but flew reconnaissance from Pearl Harbor until his eyesight grounded him. He finished out the

war on a destroyer. He received several Purple Hearts during his years of service. Upon his release from the Navy, he went to work at Celanese in Corpus Christi, Texas. Later, he attracted the attention of Dow management while working in Freeport, Texas as a pipefitter. All efforts to start the unit on which he was working had failed. He told

Plant management that he could start it in seven days if he were allowed to take control of the project. He successfully fulfilled his promise and as a reward, Dow transferred him to their research group, where he began work as a technician. He got a degree in Chemical engineering and had a long and successful career as a research engineer. Frank married Lula Jean Brown and had three children. They are Mark A. Gladney of Houston, Michael Dennis Gladney of Freeport, and Nancy J. Gladney, deceased. Frank died in 1987 in Freeport, Texas.

Vice President's Page

The folklore of the South Carolina Up Country is predominantly English and Scotch-Irish. From the English and Scottish ballads, to their belief in spells, it remains unique: farmers plant their beans carefully at the "right time of the moon"; some people carry on their person a small raw potato to absorb the rheumatism from their bodies; warts are conjured away by many formulas; the cries of owls and whippoorwills are regarded as bad luck. A fisherman in the coastal section should never talk with an old woman before he casts off; but it is lucky to talk to a young girl. The up country fisherman must spit on his bait so the fish will bite; and this poem is used by some still:

If the wind comes from the north, fish bite like a horse; If the wind comes from the south, they bite like a louse; If the wind comes from the east, they bite the least; If the wind comes from the west, they bite the best.

No feature of Southern life is more striking to an outsider than the cohesiveness of families — a clannishness rooted deep in the social structure. Everybody seems related to everybody else, and these kinships are treasured to the remotest cousinhood. Family picnics, reunions, barbecues and front porch visiting are still favorite pastimes, and the first question put to a stranger defines one's ability to place him as to family, religion and region of birth. Much of this family spirit grew out of the exigencies of pioneer life, and it was preserved and intensified by the hardships that followed the War between the States. Communal activities in which families join to help each other, i.e. hog killing, quilting, house building, corn shucking, and harvesting are still fairly common in the up country today. The barbecue is perennial in South Carolina. Recorded by travellers before 1700, it is one of the few surviving customs taken over from the Indians, the word having been brought in by the Spanish from the extinct Taino Indians of the Bahamas. The feast is usually prepared for groups of people for a celebration or neighborhood get togethers, which sometimes include an annual affair where friends gather to clean up the graveyard, dig up weeds, and prop up the sagging tombstones of old and treasured cemeteries.











All this, plus much more, comes from the <u>History of South Carolina</u> and seemed to me to depict some of the feelings Gladneys feel about our inheritance. Do you plant your gardens on Good Friday? My family always did! Do you spit on your hook? My grandchildren are told by Grandpa to do this so the fish will bite! Do you get that tingling sensation when you get a message from one of our "cousins?" I do!!

have become a beacon for Gladneys everywhere who are seeking their heritage.

Many of you have offered to submit corrections and updated information to Mrs. Amold's work. Until now, we have had no plan, nor any single person with the time and resources to compile and organize the data. However, thanks in part to Mr. George Lyon, a GIA member, we have a tentative plan to build a database that can be continually updated.

It is a big job that will require a lot of time and several people with computers. It will also require your help. You could begin to compile data on your family. Some of you may be able to pick up where the book left off and come forward to yourself. Don't forget your cousins who may be left out if you don't record their information. If you have a computer, prepare as much of your family information on disk computer so that it can later be copied into the Gladney family files. Data does not have to be on computer disk, but it will be important that it is very

legible.

We cannot begin to update until the first 108 pages of the lineage in the *Gladneys In America* book are entered into a computer program. This promises to be an ambitious task which will be distributed between several individuals.

We'll let you know when and where to send your family data.

GLADNEY FAMILY FEATURED IN MISSOURI PAPER

The following article was taken from the Columbia Daily Tribune, Columbia Missouri.

From time to time the Tribune spotlights longtime subscribers, especially those whom we deem to be of special interest.

Tribune Reader Profile:

Betty June and Wayne Gladney

A beautiful home, two artfully decorated Christmas trees, the smell of cookies baking, and two charming people — what a delightful way to spend an afternoon! It's too bad I have to work for a living because such a pleasant assignment I would do for free.

Though the family name is seldom found, it has become evident that the few "findings" are in some way related to the Columbia Gladneys. The name Gladney is Irish and without intending to be "corny", I find the first syllable (GLAD) somehow descriptive of the effect they generate.

Justifiably proud of his family name, Wayne brings into the conversation the Edna Gladney Home for Unwed Mothers in Ft. Worth, TX. A good many years ago this facility was

made famous by a movie production, "Blossoms in the Dust," starring Greer Garson and Walter Pidgeon. For her work in the vehicle, Miss Garson won an Academy Award. The Gladney Home is still flourishing and fairly recently one of their children was adopted by George Bush, Jr.

Mr. Gladney was born on a farm in the Troy/Elsberry vicinity and Mrs. Gladney was born in Macon County. The story of their "merger" is romantic and seemingly proves something about fate. From about 1940 Betty June (Graves) and Wayne lived on adjoining farms north of Columbia and their fathers rode to work together, but because of a few years age difference (which at 12 and 17 is so



important) they never really crossed paths. Once several years later on a date with a friend who suggested that farmer Graves had a daughter who might complete their foursome, Wayne was paired with Betty June. The rest, as the saying goes, is history.

In 1945 Wayne enlisted in the Navy but was fortunate that the war ended before he was sent overseas. For his year-plus service he worked in a hospital in Vallejo, California.

Two daughters were born to the Gladneys and both have made quite a name for themselves. Rebecca has been a part of the staff at McAdams' for some time and when Philip died, the business was left to her. Suzanne is a legal aid lawyer who practices in Kansas City and is an advocate for immigration problems as well as a constant volunteer. Her case load is heavy and, as the only legal aid lawyer handling immigration work in Missouri or Kansas, she sometimes has as many as 700 active cases. When her father reminded her of how much more money she could make in private practice, she informed him she wasn't in it for the money. A couple of years ago, the Kansas City Star ran a three-page story with pictures in the rotogravure section about Suzanne and her philanthropic use of her time and training.

As owners for 20 years of Ernie's Steak house and involvement with several other endeavors, Wayne and Betty June might well be ready for leisure in retirement, but retirement has not meant idleness. He volunteers as a driver for Meals On Wheels and both of them are independent contractors for Federal Express.

During his college years, Wayne was a frequent customer at a cafe at the corner of 9th and Elm. Other frequent habitués and buddies were Hank Waters, Tom McAfee, Max Baird and (later to be Judge) Scott Wright. His connection to the Tribune persona runs from Frank Hold (former head of Tribune personnel) to school days with Luke Chase (formerly with the Trib's business office and display advertising) to living close to Francis Pike (who retired after 60 years with the Tribune).

The plans for the lovely Gladney home came from an architect's drawing in the Tribune. Some time ago the newspaper ran choice plans at regular intervals. Their association with the Tribune has remained close for about 40 years.

Wayne says Betty June reads the Trib "backwards" while he starts at the front page and reads through. They "always read" Hank's editorials. Other features they look for are Ellen Goodman, the obituaries, Mike Royko and Irene Haskins. Betty June is involved with the Garden Club and of course seeks out pertinent writing. A source of pride is her flower garden in the circular driveway facing their house.

With their sense of humor and the sunny disposition they both exhibit, they are a real joy to talk with. We even share a mutual interest in cats and I was introduced to their beautiful "Snowball." Wayne says he differs with those people who look back and long for "the good old days" because he thinks the good old days are right now. Personally, I'd say the "good old days" are times spent in the company of the Gladneys.

Thank you both for sharing with us your time and your times and for maintaining for many years your Tribune readership.

Mrs. Gladney went on to tell of an incident in which she had to instruct Mr. Parker about where **NOT** to leave the elephant when he had to leave.





Ellen Gladney, b. 1874, d. 1947, Oakland Cemetery, Northeast Section, Block 1, Monticello, AR

Leanna Gladney, b. 20 April 1845, d. 2 May 1897, Old Saline Cemetery, Wilmar/Monticello Rd., AR, Wife of R. J. Gladney (GIA pg 55).

Lettie B. Gladney (Black), d. 24 July 1980, Campground Cemetery, Drew Co.

Oakland Cemetery is on land that originally belonged to W. D. & Susannah Gibson Ford. Susannah was the daughter of Zachariah Gibson, b. 1800 Fairfield, SC. They sold the cemetery 15 acres in 1866. The timber was so thick a road had to be cut to bury the first person. It is now the largest cemetery in the area.

VIRGINIA'S CARROT CAKE

1-1/2 C. plain flour

2 C. sugar 1-1/2 C. salad oil 4 eggs

(pack hard to measure)

1-1/2 tsp nutmeg 1/2 tsp. salt 3-3/4 Tbs. hot water 1/2 C. black walnuts 1-1/2 C. grated carrots

1 tsp. vanilla flavoring 1 C. coconut - grated 1/2 tsp. baking powder 2-1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Separate egg yolks & whites. Beat whites and put in refrigerator. Beat yolk & sugar together. Add salad oil, beating well to mix. Add hot water, beating between tablespoons. Add carrots to egg yolk mixture. Sift together flour and spices, baking powder, baking soda until well mixed. Add flour mixture to egg yolks and carrot mixture, beating well between spoons of flour mixture. Add vanilla, coconut and nuts and stir lightly. Fold in egg whites - do not beat mixture after folding in egg whites. Bake in a tube pan at 350 degrees for about 1-1/2 hours. Use straw to test. Cool on a cake rack. (Continued on back)

Buttermilk Icing:

1 C. sugar 1/2 C. buttermilk 1 C. butter 1 Tbs. Karo white syrup 1 tsp. vanilla 1/3 tsp. soda

Bring mixture to boil for about 11 minutes. After cooking, add vanilla. Let stand for 1-2 days, then spoon on cake. To make a harder icing, cook a little longer.


