#### Irish Travel Notes


In the fall of last year, my husband (Mike) and I embarked on an adventure that was to span five weeks in England, Ireland and Scotland. We toured for the first two weeks, by car and rail, after which time Mike returned to Texas and the demands of full-time employment. My next stop was St. Patricks University in Dublin for a seven day genealogy seminar, then on to Stranmillis College in Belfast for a five day seminar and research. On the last day in Belfast, I rented a car and drove to Ballymena where I stopped to buy new eyeglasses, but that's another story. I was only three miles from Broughshane, the lovely little town that incorporates the area that was once Kinbally. It was my intention to find the graves that Dr. Will Gladney told us about at the reunion last year. I followed his directions to Broughshane and found the only Presbyterian Church in the area, the First Broughshane Presbyterian Church. I walked around the cemetery for a couple of hours and found the graves shortly before dark. The next morning I returned with a box of chalk and carefully covered the stones with chalk so that they could be more easily photographed. The result is pictured on this page.

The stone on the left is almost illegible, but you can make out the words "... Gladney who [died]..." There were others buried here as again you can read the words "who died", and also a year of "1809".

There is much more info on the stone on the right. It reads: "... the .... of Sarah ..oor who died January ye 7th 1740 and of her Son Thomas Gladin who died January .. 1740 and of her husband Joseph Gladin who died October 1751.

Of interest also is the location and situation of the graves. They were two of four graves with a small double rail iron fence around them. The other two gravestones were newer and larger. The larger one belonged to the

Gledney Smyth family, and the one next to it had the names William Cathcart and Annie Smyth. The graves were located in front of and near the main church building.

I believe we Gladneys may be gaining some notoriety in that part of Ireland. The morning I went to photograph the gravestones, a very nice couple, Frank and Winnie Graham, walked over to inquire of my activities and to welcome me to their community. They were members of the church and had come to bring some vegetables for the Harvest Sunday church services the next day. I attended those services the next day in the church home of our Gladney ancestors. Both Winnie and Frank remembered another American woman who had labored over the same graves a year or so before. It was Gaye Gladney, Dr. Will Gladney's sister, that they recalled. And I understand that there are other Gladneys who are planning a trip soon to Ireland. Be sure to say hello to Frank and Winnie.

After a few days in County Antrim, I headed back to Scotland to find the Gladneys in Scotland. Again, I relied upon reports of earlier travels by Dr. Gladney and his family and easily found the Gladney community in the district of Cupar, north of Edinburg. I found evidence of the Gladney name in abundance, but as with Dr. Gladney, no one remembered knowing anyone with the name Gladney.

During my visit to Ireland, I looked in the phone book and found only one Gladney listed throughout Ireland, one Edward Gladney in Dublin. I was unable to reach him by phone. I have since learned that there are a good many Gladneys in Co. Carlow.

We are carefully planning the next trip as soon as the numbers on the credit card heal. We invite those of you who are going on "heritage seeking" trips to share your travel experiences with us.

#### Earlier Gladneys In America?

ast year, Bettye Bond discovered a handwritten note in the Research Room of Fairfield Museum in Winnsboro. It bore the words:

Samuel Gladney, b 1663 Scotland, d 1742 SC, mrd Margaret Gladney, b 1667 England, d 1733 England.

There is further evidence of Gladneys in America prior to the Widow Jane Wilson Gladney and her sons. This info comes from Patrick O. Gladney who has family in Detroit, New York, Washington D.C., California and Minnesota and are all descendants of Gladnevs from Co. Carlow Ireland. These Gladneys were Catholic and emigrated to Newfoundland. Canada in 1799. In fact, many of his Gladney ancestors remained in Co. Carlow, and still live there today. Patrick has retained the services of an Irish researcher in the Co. Carlow area, who has already confirmed numerous births, deaths, marriages, and land ownership of Gladneys in Co. Carlow dating back to the late 1700s.

It is possible and probable that both these families are related, but until a link is established, we must all accept the evidence that not all Gladneys in America are descended from our Richard and Jane Wilson Gladney.

Thank you Patrick Gladney for sharing your research with us.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a gown of silk shantung which featured a scoop neckline with multiple rows of creamy pearls, which continued in scrolls across the back and sleeves. The simple lines of the full skirt were extended to the cathedral train, which was enhanced by a full puff bow. She wore her maternal grandmother's strand of pearls and at her waist, a medallion of the groom's family tartan.





Racavan, Augt 6th, 1823 Dear Brother

I send this line to inform you that I am in good health, as also all the rest of our family; only our mother who for some time past has been afflicted with a severe headache. We received your letter dated the 3rd of April last, and at the time we received your letter we had sent away one by a Mr. Taggart who had come home from America, but he was not left Ireland for some time after yours came to hands. Your father thinks you might have come home to see us before you had changed your life, but since it has happened otherwise, we are all quite happy and contented that you have made such a prudent choice, and James yourself into a respectable family whom we all know so well.

Dear Brother, I had some thoughts of coming to you, but now — on account of mother's want of health, I am advised by her and father to stop at home till we see what will be the end, and perhaps in process of time, we may all by the blessing of God meet

you in America. Aunt Jane is in a poor state of health, Brother William is something better than formerly, Uncle John and all our other relations are well. We have to inform you that Uncle Robert White has sold Tullog [sic], and is in Craigamoy, and Aunt is in a very poor state of health - Brother Andrew [Watt] and sister Jenny and family are well and send their love to you both, and sister Jenny in particular is very well pleased at your prudent choice of a wife - please to send an answer and let us know more fully what you paid for your purchase of woodland and how its to be paid, whether in sales by installment, or all together, and also all the circumstances both of the

place and also of the bargain -

Give our joint loves to Uncle John Dick and aunt. Also to William and Thomas Dick. Uncle Patrick's family are all well. Also William Brown and family, Uncle William Owen and family. His son William went to South Carolina to his Cousin Gladney, with whom he continues to their, we are so hurried for him as the Beaver is just going off that we can't get Cousin Owen's letter or we would inform you all about it. All you wish to know about our country, let us understand it in your next letter and I shall inform you of all. I conclude with the joint prayers and good wishes of the whole family, your leving brother, James Black

This letter was written to Margaret Black peases[sic] father (Brice Black) by his brother James Black from Racavan, Ireland.

New Book: The following is a short description recently published book about Scotland.

#### TURAS TROIMH ALBA

Turas Troimh Alba (Gaelic for "Journey through Scotland") is a beautiful collection of 170 color photographs with interesting, historical and amusing text. The author/ photographer/publisher spent four years in Scotland, initially on assignment with the U.S. Marine Corps and later as a bicycle tour guide. His travels, primarily on single-track roads and away from the main thoroughfares, present a delightful view of the country and its people not often encountered by most visitors. The quality of the photography is superb, as evidenced by the author's meeting with a senior editor at National Geographic magazine after she saw the book and was intrigued by it. In addition to recording the glens and castles, he also took the time to meet the people. The book is peppered with quintessentially Scottish characters such as Bert Rowan, the bagpipe maker, Harry, the post card vendor, "The Birdman of Princes Street Gardens, and Walter Blakey, "The Mole Catcher." From the Borders to the Highlands, from the East Neuk to the Western Isles, Turas Troimh Alba is a journey to be enjoyed time and time again.

#### Bounty As Per Tax Act of 1760

The document given to Jane Gladney to certify her land grant, bearing the official seal of the government, also bore the word "Bounty" transcribed across it. She was the only member of the Gladney immigrants whose grant was thus marked. (Pg. 111, Gladneys In America by Mildred Arnold)

This entitlement of 4 pounds was being offered to "poor Protestants" from Europe to settle in the region, ...

Those words are part of the text written by Mildred Arnold in her family history book, Gladneys In America. I didn't understand the significance of the stamp "Bounty", but have recently read an explanation in a book by Billy Kennedy called The Scots-Irish in the Carolinas.

From page 62 of Mr.

Kennedy's aforementioned book:

The majority of the immigrants arrived in South Carolina under the "bounty" scheme. This entitlement of 4 pounds was being offered to "poor Protestants" from Europe to settle in the region, with smaller amounts paid to children. The Scots-Irish were among those who availed generously of the bounty, but when the offer was abolished in 1768, the South Carolina authorities ruled that the settlers should be given lands free.

It appears that Mildred Arnold was much more thorough that I and many others. The following was found among her manuscript notes:

South Carolina's Emancipation Proclamation - Tax Act of 1760

- 1. Colony paid the transportation cost for immigrants coming from abroad, and provided the "Bounty" payment to help settle new arrivals in the townships.
- 2. Persons coming in without money thus did not have to be indented to pay for their passage. This resulted in flood of settlers until the Act expired in July 1768. Bounty:
- 1. Payment of cost of settlement provided by the Colony for settlers from overseas resulted in many "Foreign Protestants."
- 2. Kings Bounty payment of cost of grant of

land to retired soldiers or civil officials, with quantity of land related to military rank. The King paid these costs. Plats almost always say "Bounty."

Which might lead one to ask (as it did Bettye Bond) — "Could this mean that Jane Wilson Gladney's husband, Richard, was in the military or a civil servant?"



#### Scots-Grish in the Carolinas

In the preceding article regarding Bounty, I quoted from a book by Billy Kennedy. Before quoting from the book, I wrote to the author and his publisher, asking for permission to quote in our newsletter. Permission was granted with one requirement, i.e. credit author and include info about publisher. This I can do, with pleasure.

This book is the finest of its type I have ever found. It offers detailed info on much of the history that involves our Gladneys, in both Ireland and the Carolinas. There are stories about the Rev. Wm Martin, John C. Calhoun, and mentions of the Moores, Kennedys, Pedens, McDills, McClures and Alexanders, among many more. Great book! I'll bring my copy to the reunion for those of you who want to see it.
